A signature building for downtown Wellen Park

One day in the not-too-distant future, Wellen Park will offer a downtown to residents and visitors, a welcoming, walkable destination

that will have something special for everyone.

The face of Downtown Wellen will be a twostory mixed-use building that includes retail and restaurants on the first floor and office space on the second. A. Lys Brows & Beauty

You'll put on a happy face after visiting A. Lys Brows & Beauty, which opened last July in the Wellen Park Marketplace.

The business offers services and products to enhance natural beauty, promote relaxation, reduce stress and help people look and

It's something that mother-and-daughter owners Arpina Lys and Liana Dorgelus have been doing for years.

"We had a location that was too small and were hearing a lot about the upcoming development in Wellen Park," says Ms. Lys. "We were presented with a great opportunity to open up in this plaza.

"It's such a great location," she continues. "We have a lot of exposure from people going to Publix and Irma's Tacos next door."

Ms. Lys is a licensed esthetician with an artist's eye for eyebrow shaping. She received her training as a facial specialist from the Florida College of Natural Health. Ms. Dorgelus received her esthetic training from the Florida School of Electrolysis and Skin Care. She is certified in brow threading, makeup applications and skin treatments. Both are also licensed permanent makeup tattoo artists.

Ms. Lys says their most popular service is threading eyebrows as well as upper lips, chins and full faces.

"We're the only ones between Sarasota and Fort Myers (who offer this treatment)," she says. Threading, she explains, provides a crisp, sharp eyebrow look in less than 10 minutes. Compared with waxing or tweezing, it's much cleaner and gentler on the skin. "It's the most precise way to shape the eyebrows," she says, adding people who use Retin-A on their

skin should not wax because that can damage the sensitive top layer of their skin.

Other services at A. Lys Brows & Beauty include facials, eyelash and eyebrow tinting, individual eyelash extensions, microblading and permanent makeup and semi-permanent makeup.

They recently added lash lifting, which Ms. Lys describes as "like a perm" that lifts the eyelashes. The treatment can include tinting. "The beauty industry is growing. New techniques and services are being introduced," she says. "We like to stay on top of what our customers want."

Both women and men come to the salon. Men often want their eyebrows reshaped, deep cleaning facials, removal of skin impurities such as milia and skin tags, and skin

treatments for broken capillaries and hyperpigmentation.

The duo has a location in Port Charlotte and is opening another later this year in the Cocoplum Village Shops in North Port.

recognizable that people can orient themselves to when they're in Downtown Wellen.

Renderings suggest a structure that fits into the laid-back Southwest Florida style: low cut, Spanish influence, pastels. The design includes covered walkways, three restaurants, patio dining and other amenities.

"A core aspect of the design is its connection to the outdoor spaces the building occupies," Mr. Wold says, adding the restaurants will have outdoor seating and café seating as well. And most of the parking will be in the rear of the building in order to enhance the pedestrian experience.

The building's second floor, accessible via stairways and an elevator, thoughtfully divides multiple office spaces, each with expansive outdoor terraces overlooking the grand lawn and the lake, and a glass corridor that connects the buildings.

A possible outcome is the building will attract customers that will come for the retail, or to enjoy the shade and courtyard spaces, but stay or return for the businesses above.

The Downtown Wellen building will give Trapolin-Peer another foothold in Southwest Florida.

"It's beautiful," says Peter Trapolin, who founded the firm in 1981. "We've done work in Florida before, but this is our first building in the Southwest Florida area. We're excited to be here."

The design took several months to complete. "It wasn't as though we arrived at this design at our first pass," Mr. Wold says. "We went through many different schemes ... the word we kept using was 'transitional style.'

"We weren't looking for something either strictly traditional or ultra-modern."

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
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

The Atlanta Braves Foundation is the team's charitable arm that supports local, regional and national charities throughout country, according to Mike Dunn, Braves' vice president of Florida operations. Since 1994, the foundation has provided support to thousands of organizations and has contributed more than \$7 million in financial and in-kind assistance to the community through the generosity of Braves players, employees, sponsors and fans.


"We'll identify those in need that we can potentially impact — often with no pomp and circumstance," Mr. Dunn says, adding the

organization frequently maintains anonymity about the various charities it supports.

Some of the foundation's good works are public, however, including My Warrior's Place, a retreat center for veterans, military service members, law

enforcement officers, fire fighters and Gold, Blue and Silver Star families, offering many helpful programs for them.

As an example, he says, the foundation has provided motorized wheelchairs to those who depend on them to get around.

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A peaceful habitat beckons wildlife — and those who want to know it

A series of golf-course water hazards has been engineered to provide a nursery for young tarpon to to send clean, naturally filtered water to Lemon Bay.

There's a bird observation area, a butterfly garden and a kiosk constructed as an Eagle Scout project.

A killdeer nest snuggles against young plant life.

Welcome to the Lemon Creek Wildflower Preserve in Englewood, an 80-acre swath of land that served as an 18-hole executive golf



course from the early 1970s to 2006. Off Gasparilla Pines Boulevard on the Cape Haze peninsula, the land borders five condominium complexes and has been in the hands of the Lemon Bay Conservancy since 2010.

The conservancy has transformed the golf

course into a peaceful preserve for wildlife and wetlands growth, planting about 8,000 trees and shrubs in dozens of species throughout the acreage.

The primary purpose of the preserve is to protect and enhance the habitats within the preserve in order to provide a refuge for wildlife and opportunities for environmental education and scientific research. The long-range goal is to convert the existing golf course ponds into a series of interconnected wetlands and to restore the uplands to

native habitats. Planners envision freshwater wetlands on the eastern side of the preserve transitioning to tidal wetlands on the western

Eva Furner, a nearby resident and a conservancy board member, amplifies that mission.

"The primary reason we're doing this is to help the water — and to help wildlife habitat," she says. "But we also want to use it as a place that educates the public about the value of restoration. We've created a whole trail network through the preserve, and we're doing regular nature walks, scavenger hunts and other events to promote continuing education about the value of adding habitat.

"We're adding things of value to the community, not only from the preservation

Some of the walks are for members; others include the general public.

Ms. Furner points out a man-made mound that looks suspiciously like a onetime golf course tee. But she says no and points to a couple of cattle egrets on the side looking

"We never had cattle egrets before," she says. "But they really like this habitat with so many insects.'

Not that vestiges of the golf course don't still exist. Tees and greens are part of the

landscape. They're just different — as in, not manicured. And those water hazards might be home to a gator or two these days.

Although she is not an ecologist or botanist — Ms. Furner is a retiree from IBM she has a strong interest in the environment and she knows Lemon Creek Wildflower Preserve well

"I've just always enjoyed nature," she says. "Here, you have so many opportunities to get out and explore things." Exploration can begin with a visit to the website, www.lemonbayconservancy.org/wildflower-preserve, where details are also available about guided walks and other activities.

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Reel in dinner from the Fresh Catch food truck

You could spend a few hours on a boat, hoping the fish you want grabs your line.

Or, you could reliably count on the Fresh Catch food trucks that visit Gran Paradiso, Grand Palm, IslandWalk, Renaissance and Sarasota National as well as the Englewood Farmer's Market and Atlanta Braves.

Fresh Catch Fish Company was established in 2014. In addition to its store in Punta Gorda, its food trucks make weekly stops at dozens of locations from Tampa/St. Pete to Marco Island.

The owners work with local and national commercial fishing operators to source fresh seafood. But the trucks also are known for their fresh-cut meats, homemade sausages and prepared foods.

The dozens of fin fish they sell include amberjack, cod, barramundi, bronzini, catfish, Chilean sea bass, cobia, corvina, Dover sole, yellow tail snapper, swordfish, tripletail, turbot, wahoo and walleve.

Local favorites include cobia, grouper, hogfish, mahi-mahi, red snapper, triggerfish and tripletail.

They also have shellfish such as clams, lobster tail, mussels, oysters, sea scallops, shrimp and stone crabs.

There are many alternatives to seafood as well. Meat eaters can choose from chicken breast fillets, filet mignon, French-cut Duroc pork chops, New York strip steak, half-pound prime beef patties, ribeye steak, T-bone steak and top sirloin.

Customers can also dig into beef tenderloin pot pie, poppyseed chicken pot pie, roasted chicken pot pie and shepherd's pot pie.

Stuff yourself with sausages that include butifarra, chicken apple, chicken basil, chorizo picante, half smoke, lamb merguez, maple sage, Mediterranean lamb, pastrami, raging brat, rosemary lamb, spicy Italian, sweet Italian and Thai chicken.

The meats are on a roll with a wide variety of salamis: ararat, cacciatore, chajari, Chesapeake with Maryland crab seasoning, Chorizo de Pamplona, cinta, dillio, duck breast prosciutto, fuet, wild fennel, porcini, soppressata and truffle mania.

If vou're not sure how to prepare the fish or meat you've purchased, the Fresh Catch website will inspire you with mouthwatering recipes. Add these to your recipe file: Florida blue crab cakes with tangy butter sauce, low country shrimp boil, baked tripletail, seared mahi mahi, Faroe Island salmon, steamed mussels with white wine and garlic, chicken breasts with balsamic vinegar and garlic, and pan-roasted New York strip steak.

When you don't feel like cooking, pick up a ready-made dinner like Cajun mac and cheese, Cajun jambalaya, seafood casserole, shrimp scampi, lobster-stuffed chicken breast or chicken stuffed with spinach, ricotta and feta cheese.

Start your meal with a homemade snack dip. Fresh Catch has crab, lobster, smoked rainbow trout and smoked salmon artichoke flavors.

And don't forget the extra goodies like clam chowder, lobster bisque, crab cakes, crabstuffed portobello mushrooms, and salmon

Make it at home

Faroe Islands Salmon with Miso Sesame Ginger Glaze and String Beans

Prep time: 10 minutes Cook time: 10 minutes Servings: 4

- 2 TBS extra virgin olive oil
- 11/4 pounds Faroe Islands salmon filet
- ½ cup Nature's Basket Organic Miso Sesame Ginger dressing, divided
- 1 lb. French green beans, trimmed (also available frozen)
- 1/4 cup green onion, chopped diagonally
- 1 tsp black sesame seeds for garnish

Arrange a rack in the middle of the oven and set to broil. Line a baking pan with foil and coat with oil. Place salmon, skin side down, on baking pan. Use a paring knife to score the salmon with 1/4-inch-deep diagonal cuts, about 2 inches apart. Spread 1/4 cup of dressing over salmon. Broil for 10-12 minutes, rotating the pan a few times, until lightly browned and internal temperature of fish reaches 145 degrees. Remove from oven and drizzle with 2

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Faroe Islands Salmon with Miso Sesame Ginger Glaze and String Beans.

TBS dressing.

Meanwhile, bring a large pot of water to boil. Cook beans for 2-3 minutes, until bright green and crisp-tender. Use a slotted spoon to transfer beans to a medium bowl. Toss with 2 remaining TBS of dressing. Cover with foil to keep warm.

Serve salmon garnished with green onions and sesame seeds, alongside green beans.

For a wine to enjoy with this dish, we recommend a pinot noir. If that is not your preference, go with a big and rich chardonnay.







He sees moms and dads jogging with kids in strollers, couples walking hand-in-hand, pet owners exercising their dogs, cyclists, running groups and people carrying gear to a favorite fishing hole.

And that's exactly how the community's planners envisioned the way people would enjoy the trail system.

"Our commitment to trails and pathways is paramount," Mr. Severance emphasizes. "It's where wellness thrives. Trails have a way of engaging both in the physical aspect of wellness and the mental and psychological

benefits of wellness." He also notes that people who are active often have improved health, including better memory.

Wellen Park currently has nine trails that range from .67 miles along the West Villages Parkway Lake Loop to 6.3 miles along the West Villages Loop.

An additional 15 miles of trails are planned during the next five years. These will include a north-south trail of about 3 miles that abuts a pristine wetland and a trail around the 80-acre lake that will be the centerpiece of Downtown Wellen.

Mr. Severance says the trails are integral to the success of Wellen Park because they help connect people in the community. Studies also show that trails are the No. 1 amenity people are looking for when buying a home,





"Some of the process is with just a few of their pieces on display. Painter Laura Pommier was recently presented in this publication as the featured artist, and some of her work is currently on exhibit a finished piece in four weeks. So why be in at the center; now you can also see works by the gifted potter Keith Charron.

When Mr. Charron got out of the Army in 1967, he went to work in his parents' ceramics studio in Massachusetts, returning "on and off" for a few years, frequently pitching in when they needed help with the business. His love and appreciation of pottery soon grew into a desire to create his own pieces, to continue learning about the field, and eventually to share his knowledge with others.

He moved to Punta Gorda in 2005 and of course brought along his love of art and the desire to continue to create it. After taking some classes to further expand his knowledge of the medium, he became an instructor.

best part of my art," he says. "I just love to see the look on a student's face when they truly get what they've been learning."

Even with some necessary limitations because of the pandemic, he continues to hold classes in much the same way he always has: He purposely presents his "On the Wheel Again" sessions to very small classes - sometimes just one or two students (adults only) and never more than four or five — per sixweek session.

"I don't want to have larger classes where a lot of the students' time is spent waiting for a chance to ask a question," he explains.

Held at the North Port Area Art Center from 9 a.m. to noon on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, the classes are as malleable as the clay that's worked with: There is no "one schedule fits all" beginning or end to the curriculum, so everyone doesn't have to start on the same day; you can jump in any time and your complete six weeks will begin with lesson one at that session, no matter where other

He estimates that each student will have class for six? "The second week, you'll start your second piece; that way you always have something in the pipeline be working on," he savs.

Classes are held year-round. All are welcome and must agree to follow CDC guidelines of wearing masks and maintaining a safe, courteous distance from other students.



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
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

Rumor Mill Roundup



Hello, Neighbors - It's time again for the Rumor Mill Roundup addressing some topics we've heard around the watercooler and some questions we've been asked about most often in the Wellen Park Welcome Center. Below are brief summaries of the "real story" for our most recent topics of interest. This is just a very friendly reminder that even though you might have read it on social media or heard it over drinks, it might not be totally true.

■ The trail around the 80-acre lake in Downtown Wellen is all asphalt.


The trial is part concrete and part crushed shell. The concrete portion will be adjacent to Downtown Wellen's retail, dining and entertainment areas. As you meander toward the large preserve areas and fishing pier, the trail will be lined with crushed shell, which allows rainwater to seep into the soil below, reducing worries of water accumulation or runoff. Additionally, shell pathways help complete the look of a natural Florida-style landscape.

■ Cell towers are not permitted in Wellen Park.

Satisfying resident demand for greater connectivity to friends and family is extremely important to the developer, who is actively in discussions with several providers for new cell phone towers within Wellen Park. Rest assured, the placement and aesthetic nature of the towers is a key part of the overall discussion.

■ Sarasota County School District is planning to break ground on its new school campus in Wellen Park in

According to the Sarasota County School District, construction start for a new kindergarten-through-eighth-grade school and an adjacent high school is undetermined. In February, the board reviewed a proposed fiveyear capital improvement plan that includes a new high school, expected to open for the



2027-28 school year. The five-year plan is updated annually, so the district's planners can push the construction start date back if the population increase falls short of projections.

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

Take an adventurous day trip to an alternative reality

Less than an hour and a half from Wellen Park lies one of west coast Florida's cultural jewels: The Dali Museum in St. Petersburg. Dedicated to the Surrealist works of Salvador Dali, the museum opened in 1982. The debut of the new building in January 2011 has contributed to Tampa Bay's cultural renaissance - an explosion of artistic institutions and outlets.

"Our collection is grounded in the art, archives and biographical complexity of a single creative individual, honoring one person's vision, talent and life — Salvador Dali," says marketing director Beth Bell.

The building itself is a work of art as well. Its geodesic glass bubble, nicknamed "The Enigma" and comprised of 1,062 triangular glass panels, is a fitting tribute to Dalí's legacy of innovation and transformation.

In addition to a comprehensive collection of works from the artist's childhood through the end of his career (he was born in Figueras, Spain, in 1904 and died there in 1989), the museum regularly features special exhibits of other well-known and some not-so-wellknown artists. Through May 2, for example, visitors can see the 2021 Student Surrealist Art Exhibit. Initiated in 1992, this annual show

The traveling "Van Gogh Alive" exhibit's stop at The Dali has been extended through June 13. Visitors experience Vincent van Gogh's works in an immersive art installation that opens a new window into the celebrated painter's artistic genius and delivers the sensation of walking right into his paintings.

"Visitors love the musical score and the immersive visual format and are often struck with emotion upon exiting," Ms. Bell says about "Van Gogh Alive." Many have described the experience as "magical," she says, adding, "We have been overwhelmed by the enthusiastic response."

Since it opened in November 2019, "Visual Magic: Dalí's Masterworks in AR" has allowed visitors to view eight pieces in the museum's permanent collection using augmented reality technology to gain a deeper understanding of the meaning behind their complex imagery.


Coined by museum founder A. Reynolds Morse, the term "masterworks" refers to paintings exceeding 5 feet in height or width and painted over a period of a year or longer — in other words, they are both monumental in scale and critical Dalí paintings. To see these works through the lens of AR, a free app is available for iOS and android. Then view them in the museum's James Family Wing (or reproductions of the works from anywhere on a personal device).

Coming up next, "At Home with Dalí," an exhibit showcasing a diverse group of Dali portraits by five photographers, opens July 1 and will be featured indefinitely. Dating from the 1950s and early 1960s, the images provide an intimate view of Dalí in his home environment in the Catalonia region of Spain.

The museum is taking appropriate pandemic precautions, operating at reduced capacity via advance timed tickets. Staff and visitors must wear masks and have a thermal temperature check upon entering the building. Physical distancing reminders, plexi-screens and hand-sanitizer stations are placed in key locations. All payments at parking, store and café must be via credit card only.

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Resident loves sense of community at Island Walk

It was moving day for Rick Arrighi, making it seem he might not be a good candidate for this "Why I Live Here" feature.

No worries. The Rhode Island native and retired railroad dispatcher wasn't moving out of IslandWalk at Wellen Park, where he has been a happy resident since 2018. He was simply moving nearby, from a rental and into the home his step-daughter, Tanya, shares with her wife, Stephanie.

"I hate moving," he grumbles.

But he loves IslandWalk, "so I'm not going anywhere," he says. "I'm never going to spend another winter in Rhode Island. I have a house up there that I'm putting on the market. There's no reason for me to have it."

At IslandWalk, "Everyone is so friendly. It's not like up north," he says, "It's so refreshing, so different."

The feeling, it seems, is mutual.

Mr. Arrighi is a familiar figure in the neighborhood. He plays guitar and harmonica and has become a regular performer at Barrel & Bean, the café attached to the Wellen Park Welcome Center.

The now-local musician took the long

road to get here, following a path that led from Rhode Island to Key West, and then up Florida's coast to IslandWalk.

When he retired in 2014 after 40 years with the railroad, Rick and his wife, Cindy, moved to Key West and immediately adopted the island lifestyle, one filled with music, boating and swimming. It wasn't long before they met a Duval Street entertainer and Rick asked to sit in with him.

"We went on stage," Rick recalls. "We played a song. He said, 'Do you want to do another?" Soon he was covering for another musician who was ailing. "It was a baptism by fire," he says.

By 2018, however, Key West was losing its allure. Rick and Cindy got in their camper and started exploring other areas of the Sunshine State. They parked for a couple of months at a campground in North Port to be near Tanya and Stephanie. They were back on the road, headed to the Grand Canyon, when COVID-19 hit.

"We high-tailed it back to Florida," Rick says. Then Cindy was diagnosed with cancer. She died in January, and Tanya and Stephanie invited Rick to move in with them.

"And that's why I'm here," he says. He's a popular figure at Barrel & Bean.

he says.

Because Wellen Park is being built on a former ranch, the development team has been able to utilize the natural landscape when creating the trails.

Halff, a nationwide engineering firm, prepared a master trail development plan for Wellen Park.

"We took advantage of vistas across wetlands, prairies and ponds," says Mark Llewellyn Sr., executive vice president of Florida operations for Halff

Plans call for wayfinding signs at trailheads to help people navigate where paths cross, and signs with QR codes to learn more about native flora and fauna in the area. There will also be benches and shaded areas.

"In the Florida heat, it's important to provide places for people to rest, cool down, and have a drink of water," Mr. Llewellyn says.

The existing paths and trails are concrete or asphalt, though some of the new paths will be crushed shell or boardwalk over wetlands.

Mr. Severance says safety was paramount, so the bike lanes and roads are wide and the concrete paths are 12 feet across.

"We want people to feel comfortable and be able to do two-way modality on the trails," he says.

The developer is also considering how to connect Wellen Park's several neighborhoods through the trails and paths.

"Good trail design takes advantage of the natural environment and takes into consideration where pedestrians will likely access them, and how they will safely move from point A to point B," Mr. Severance says.

Mr. Llewellyn notes that the Wellen Park



trails might connect to longer-distance regional trails, such as the state's Shared-Use Nonmotorized (SUN) Trail. Already, the Wellen Park trails feed into a trail at the nearby State College of Florida.

The state has also almost finalized its Coastto-Coast Trail, which will stretch 250 miles from St. Petersburg to Titusville.

"From an eco-tourism standpoint," Mr. Llewellyn says, "there are all kinds of things happening in communities that will support these long-distance trails."

As the number of Wellen Park trails and pathways continues to increase, Mr. Severance envisions offering more activities along them.

"I absolutely want to host some nontraditional events," he says, suggesting an adventure event that includes multiple sports as well as activities such as kayaking, biking, fun runs and fishing rodeos.

"The goal is to expand and enhance our trail network as Wellen Park continues to evolve and develop future residential areas," he says. 'We continue to hear from residents how our trails and pathways improves their quality of life."

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















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
