With a ribbon cutting event set for Wednesday, Oct. 28, the Wellen Park Welcome Center will serve as the first stop for future home buyers to learn about the neighborhoods, builders and amenities within the master-planned community.

Throughout the center, numerous touch screens present up-to-the-minute information on the features of Wellen Park's many neighborhoods, including model home plans and available move-in ready/quick move-in homes.

Becky DeGeorge leads the center's team of community ambassadors. Experts on "all things Wellen Park," the ambassadors are on hand to familiarize prospective buyers and real estate agents with all the ins and outs of the community.

"We ask what they need," Ms. DeGeorge says. "What do they want in a community? Do they play golf? Do they want a large home? A villa?

"We streamline the home-buying process by helping buyers and their real estate agents identify the neighborhoods they want to explore and tour in greater detail." For families that are considering a move to Wellen Park, the



IslandWalk's community garden is reaping bushels of fun

There are a lot of green thumbs in IslandWalk at West Villages.

When 74 planting beds at the new community garden became available in June, they were sold out within hours.

"Before DiVosta Homes built the amenities, they did a survey and people loved the idea of a community garden," Lifestyle Director Mark Craycraft says. "Our sign-up lottery went quickly. We have a waiting list of about 20 people."

Each 4x8-foot plot contains two irrigated 4x4-foot beds. Each resident can rent one plot (\$10 for six months, \$25 for 12 months).

By late summer this year, some residents were already eating the fruits of their

"My squash has been amazing," says Cindy Hurwitz, who had harvested at least three dozen by early September. She has also done well with cucumber, red pepper and zucchini.

Ms. Hurwitz had an extensive garden when she lived in Rochester, N.Y., but found success hard to come by with container gardening on her lanai in IslandWalk. She was one of the first to log on and register for a community garden plot when the link went live.

In just a few months, she's learned a lot about the challenges of gardening in Florida.

"The heat and the sun are so strong," she says, adding she soon realized she needed to filter the sunshine. She had bought some start-

er plants at local home improvement stores and noticed that they had screening over their plants. She purchased a similar material and strung it from four poles over her garden plot.

"It filters beautifully," she says. Her fellow community gardeners took note, and "now everybody has screening."

She also learned that the soil needs potassium and calcium supplements and that she sometimes needs to water twice a day.

Ms. Hurwitz is happy to share what she's learned with her neighbors.

"I'm at the garden a lot in the evening and talk to a lot of people who ask for suggestions because I have a very successful garden," she says, adding many of the people she meets are first-time gardeners.

Barbara Bryden is not one who needed lessons. A master gardener, Ms. Bryden was very happy to have a plot to grow vegetables and also interact with her neighbors. "People who are gardeners are generally lovely people," she notes.

Like Ms. Hurwitz, she also unearthed the differences between gardening here and when she lived in New York and Maryland.

"The conditions are much harsher here," she says. "There is very strong sun and lots of insects. The soil has to be amended with calcium and fertilizers to make sure it's nice and thick and rich."

Ms. Bryden researched what grows well in Florida and initially decided to plant okra, peppers and cucumbers. She added lettuce

and radishes, says her eggplant was "fabulous" with about 20 on it, and plans to try tomatoes in the cooler weather.

IslandWalk provides carts for gardeners to carry their supplies, but people must bring their own soil and gardening tools.

The gardeners hold monthly meetings and often arrange for a speaker. They are planning a home and garden show in March that will have about 35 vendors and programs about conservation and the importance of bees.

Mr. Craycraft applauds DiVosta for building such a popular amenity.

'I'm glad to be part of an organization that takes the residents' comments seriously," he says. "You take a survey and bring it to life. That's pretty strong."



Taking "a lyrical approach" to line and balance

Laura Ann Pommier has, since the ripe old age of 4 years, been blessed to know exactly what her life path was to be: art.

While growing up in the Midwest (mostly Louisville), she would observe her father as he sketched just for fun, copying characters from comic strips, and then she would copy her dad's work. Once in grade school, she was fortunate enough to have very open, observant teachers who (just like her parents) immediately recognized her talent and enthusiasm and encouraged her right from the start.

Grade school, middle school, high school ... all through the years, art was a constant and important part of her life. When it came time to choose a college and a major, Ms. Pommier knew she would major in fine art, at Murray State University in Murray, Ky.

"It's still considered one of the best," she notes proudly. And that's no idle boast; this is the 30th consecutive year that U.S. News & World Report has recognized Murray for quality, value and student success, among other attributes.

Following graduation, Ms. Pommier continued creating fine art for her own satisfaction and taught workshops. She also embarked on what was to become a 23-year career creating art for newspaper advertising.

In her late 30s she decided to go back to school, this time to Indiana State University in Terre Haute, where she earned a master's degree in art.

With her three daughters doing well living their own young adult lives, Ms. Pommier felt that this was the time to put fine art at the forefront of her life. She started thinking

about all the art centers she'd found in Southwest Florida while visiting her parents here time after time, and thought, "Why wait until retirement to move to Florida?"

Her enthusiasm and excitement put her plan in action quickly — so quickly that she didn't realize heading for the Sunshine State area art shows.

would have her driving straight into Hurricane Irma. Luckily, she was able to stop and weather the storm with her daughter in Orlando before continuing to Port Charlotte. Within a month she had settled into a condo, found a part-time job and started entering


Then one day she was happily scavenging for materials and supplies at the North Port Area Art Center yard sale and discovered the fellow artists she was chatting with there weren't just being neighborly; they wanted her to start teaching at the center.

Ms. Pommier quickly accepted and jumped in with both feet. She's still teaching there today, though with the current pandemic restrictions she's teaching via Zoom for the time being. And she says that's not entirely a bad thing; utilizing Zoom also allows her to teach students in Indiana and Punta Gorda. It might not be quite as satisfying as the up close and personal camaraderie fellow artists so enjoy when taking class together in one studio, but it's certainly better than being completely cut off from the art scene and like-thinkers. Students of all levels can begin — or keep — learning, primarily in oils in such traditional areas as landscape, portrait and still life.

Much as she enjoys and excels at those subjects, when she's creating all by and for herself, Ms. Pommier tends to express herself in what she terms "my own unique style." Her website describes it this way: "Realistic paintings and drawings. Full color palette, unique perspectives, and lyrical approach to line and balance.



Making the most of your visit to Mote

How long has it been since you've had a great outing that was so wonderful it transported you to a happy place and took your mind off everything else? With few adjustments to visitor guidelines, Mote Marine Research Lab and Aquarium in Sarasota remains open to offer such an escape.


With so many venues closed or operating with reduced hours and visitor capacity because of the pandemic, Mote's marine animals and staff are proud to keep welcoming everyone 365 days of the year, even on holidays. The hours are still 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. every day.

If you've never been there, you're in for a treat.

Mote Marine Research Lab and Aquarium is a completely different animal than the usual theme parks and roadside attractions in Florida. No "tourist trap" this, the aquarium is an addition/extension to a long-standing and well-respected nonprofit sea life research/rescue/and rehabilitation program. Growing in exciting scientific stages since the 1950s, to the betterment of our sea life and marine environment, Mote has continuously extended its reach to the area's residents and tourists alike.

We asked Mote's Stephannie Kettle for some inside info as to what she considers must-see features for visitors to the aquarium. Without hesitation she gave us an enthusiastic response.

■ You must meet the Mote rescue manatees, Hugh and Buffet. Because these two gentle giants cannot be safely released back into the wild, they live a life of luxury, safety,

comfort and care at the aquarium, and delight everyone who sees them. Their huge girth coupled with the prehistoric demeanor and the extremely placid personality truly make the manatee a one-of-a-kind creature.

- The Shark Zone is a 135,000-gallon shark tank that affords visitors a rare opportunity to safely see sharks up close, along with such other gasp-inducing creatures as snook, tarpon and goliath grouper. If you want to know the real shark story that "Jaws" never touched on, this is the place to ask questions and learn.
- Need a giggle or a smile? Head for the Otters Waters exhibit and meet Mote's three North American otter rescues, Huck, Pippi

and Jane, appropriately named after three human orphans of literature. The cutest little cut-up clowns of any environment, these guys are so full of joy and energy they're sure to bring a smile. Delightful little showoffs, they seem to be energized and encouraged when an audience is present.

■ When you're swimming in the gulf or ocean, do you ever slide your feet over the smooth, cool sand under the water and wonder to yourself, "What's down there?" If so, you're bound to enjoy Contact Cove. Here you can reach out to live starfish, sea cucumbers, sea urchins, horseshoe crabs and other fascinating creatures. You might not enjoy finding them unexpectedly underfoot when

you're swimming, but take away the element of surprise and you'll see they're really quite docile and beautiful.

And there's more.

You'll also find casual outdoor dining available on site at the Deep Sea Diner, and there's a gift shop with a variety of clothing items (adult and children) and souvenirs to remind you of the animals you've seen during your visit.

Of course, with the current restrictions on public venues, visitors to Mote are reminded:

- No walk-in admissions. To practice safe crowd control, visits must now be arranged prior to arrival by buying tickets and reserving your day and time on the website at www. mote.org or by phone. This enables Mote to allocate only a certain number of admissions per hour, ensuring plenty of room to practice safe distancing with a good view all there is to see.
- All visitors over 5 years of age must wear a mask.

These simple rules should allow a great visit for everyone, in the safest possible atmosphere, so make your plans now and prepare to enjoy a day with the marine life you seldom see

BE PREPARED FOR YOUR BICYCLING ADVENTURES

Biking in Florida presents unique rewards and challenges. Before you don your helmet, think about the needs that might present for yourself and your riding companions.



BEFORE YOU HEAD OUT:

Make yourself easy to find if need be. Leave a note stating when you departed, where you're going and when you expect to return. If you're heading to less populated areas, wear colors that make you easy to see, and do NOT ride in those areas during hunting season.



IN CASE YOU NEED TO ALERT SOMEONE: Bring your fully charged cell phone and secure it in a place where it can't fall out along the way. You might also want to bring a whistle and a small flashlight.



PACE YOURSELF & COMPANIONS: When riding with others, be sure to plan the distance and pace of the ride for the comfort of all. Is someone along for the first time? Start out slow, be open to questions and concerns, respect any hesitancy or fears to ride in certain areas or conditions, and don't set a pace that makes others push themselves. This is not a race; it's supposed to be relaxing and fun.

KIDS ON BOARD? This calls for more than good listening skills; you need to keep a close eye on kids. Just because they're young and healthy doesn't mean they are physically fit; a LOT of kids aren't today. Also, in their excitement they might not stay as alert to sticks on the path, traffic, wildlife, etc. You go first, pointing out and loudly announcing any hazards you encounter.





IS YOUR DOG YOUR CO-PILOT? Realize that dogs will push themselves until they drop just to please their person, and don't let that happen. Also consider that your canine companion is getting the same exercise as you are, but doing it in bare feet and a fur coat. Look for cooler surfaces (even grass can get very hot), shady lanes, little or no traffic, frequent breaks and hydration for you both. In very hot temps, leave Fido at home in the A/C.

Wellen Park is a beautiful, bike-friendly community, so you needn't go far to enjoy pedaling for exercise, fresh air and pleasure. Should you ever want a change of scene or pace, however, there are lots of great places nearby to try. One of the most ambitious is the Legacy Trail (www.friendsofthelegacytrail.com), a former railroad corridor.

There's also the city of North Port's Paved Trail Network. If you're into mountain biking, the trail along the Myakkahatchee Creek is, according to the www.cityofnorthport.com, "one of Southwest Florida's most intense."

You might also like the Punta Gorda Linear Park or the John Yarbrough Linear Park Trail.



Executive Director Dee Dee Gozion has had her hands full with the leaps-and-bounds growth happening over at the North Port Area Art Guild. And she's glad of it.







BEST PRACTICES AND REMINDERS FOR PARENTS TO HELP ENSURE AN A+ SCHOOL YEAR

Students and their teachers aren't the only ones who make a school year a success. Families play an important role in helping children prepare for school and stay on top of assignments.



- Develop a structured routine and be consistent. A visual schedule might be helpful, and pictures can be included for younger children.
- Set a bedtime to help make sure that your child is getting adequate sleep.
- Make sure your child is provided with **nutritious meals and snacks** (these may be through the school or provided from home).
- Check your child's backpack nightly for any information or student work. Many teachers use a communication folder to send important information to and from school.
- If your child is a remote learner, make sure they're **engaged and logging in** when they are supposed to, limit their distractions, and keep camera and audio on.
- If your child attends school in person, always be prepared with their mask and water bottles.
- Check with your child's teacher to see what method of communication they use most. Some teachers have apps that are available to download on a phone they use to easily stay in touch with families. You can also email your child's teachers directly through your Parent Portal account.
- Update your School Dismissal Manager app as needed to reflect how your child will be getting home from school if there are any changes.
- Read with your child each evening. Depending on their age and reading level you might want to take turns, reading a page yourself and then having your child read a page. Ask your child questions about the story such as what they think will happen next, or how they feel about a choice a particular character made.
- Promote an open line of communication with your child by actively listening to what they have to say. Ask them specific questions about their day and talk about their feelings and any challenges they may be facing so that you can start to problem-solve together.
- Reach out to school staff with any questions or concerns so that you can work together as a team to continue to support your child.

Satisfy your tastes for Chinese and Japanese cuisine at the Marketplace

When you and your dining companion can't decide between Chinese and Japanese food, head to West Villages Marketplace where China 1 and Fuji Sushi Hibachi Noodles are near each other.

Both restaurants opened earlier this year and are owned by Danny Shi, a restaurateur with more than 30 years of experience. Mr. Shi is the chef at Fuji Sushi Hibachi Noodles; his brother Tony Shi is the chef at China 1.

"I loved to cook when I was younger," Mr. Shi says. "I went to culinary school when I was 17 and came to the United States at 19, as soon as I finished school. I kept working in restaurants because people loved my food."

Mr. Shi worked in Pennsylvania from 1991-1996 and owned restaurants in Milford, Conn., from 1996-2001. He has been in Florida for almost 20 years and has previously worked with the West Villages Marketplace developer.

China 1 serves New York-style Chinese food, which Mr. Shi says uses more soy than California-style cooking. One of the most popular dishes is General Tso's Chicken, which is chicken dipped in a thin batter and then deep fried and served with General Tso's sauce, which has more than 20 ingredients. Sweet & Sour Chicken also sells well. China 1 features chicken, pork, beef and seafood dishes.

Guests at Fuji Sushi Hibachi Noodles love the Chef Specialty Rolls that Mr. Shi and his chefs exclusively design. There are more than 30 different types of sushi, including the Dynamite Roll, which is deep fried assorted fish topped with spicy crabmeat, masago and spicy eel sauce; as well as the Autumn of Connecticut Roll, which is fresh Alaskan king crab wrapped with seaweed and rice then topped with salmon and avocado and garnished with yellowtail tobiko.

Fuji Sushi Hibachi Noodles is also known for its Hibachi Steak served with fried rice, noodles and a side of mixed vegetables, all cooked on the hibachi grill.

The restaurant serves more than a dozen types of sake.

Fall is fabulous for roasted veggies and more

We don't have "leaf season" in Southwest Florida, but you can cook up a taste of fall with these recipes created by Chef Marie LaForge, principal owner of the award-winning Mango Bistro in Englewood and one of the founders of the Englewood Farmers Market

Roasted vegetables

INGREDIENTS

- 1 small butternut squash, cubed
- 2 red bell peppers, seeded and diced
- 1 sweet potato, peeled and cubed
- 3 Yukon gold potatoes, cubed
- 1 red onion, quartered
- 1 TBS chopped fresh thyme
- 2 TBS chopped fresh rosemary ½ cup olive oil
- 2 TBS balsamic vinegar Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Preheat oven to 475 degrees.

In a large bowl, combine the squash, red bell peppers, sweet potato, and Yukon gold potatoes.

Separate the red onion quarters into pieces and add to the mixture.

In a small bowl, stir together thyme, rosemary, olive oil, vinegar, salt and pepper. Toss with vegetables until coated. Spread evenly on a large roasting pan.

Roast for 35-40 minutes, stirring every 10 minutes

or until vegetables are cooked through and browned. Serves eight.

DEGUSTATION

Roasted vegetables are a good accompaniment to grilled meat, fish and fresh pasta. You can also get creative and roast other seasonal vegetables, such as broccoli, zucchini, eggplant and asparagus.

Fresh mango and pineapple salsa

INGREDIENTS

2 fresh mangoes, diced

1/4 cup thinly diced fresh pineapple 1/4 red bell pepper, coarsely chopped

1/4 green bell pepper, coarsely chopped 1 jalapeno, seeded and minced finely (for

more heat use a habanero)

2 TBS extra virgin olive oil

1 clove garlic, minced finely

1 red onion, finely diced

4 TBS chopped fresh cilantro 2 TSP fresh lime or lemon juice

Mix all ingredients together in a bowl.

DEGUSTATION

Serve salsa at room temperature with fresh fish tacos, chips (and a homemade fresh

lime margarita) or over grilled tuna, salmon, chicken or pork.



Fabulous butterscotch french toast with apple cinnamon topping **FRENCH TOAST**

INGREDIENTS

- 8 1/2-inch-thick slices French bread 1 cup half-and-half (milk can be substituted for a lighter breakfast)
- 3 large eggs 1/4 TSP salt

4 TBS butter

In medium-size mixing bowl, whisk together the half-and-half, eggs and salt. Dip bread into mixture, allow to soak for 30 seconds on each side. Over medium-low heat, melt 1 TBS butter in a 10-inch nonstick saute pan. Place two slices of bread at a time into the pan and cook until golden brown, 2-3 minutes per side. Remove from pan and place on rack in preheated oven for 5 minutes. Repeat with all eight slices. Serve immediately

topped with caramelized apples (recipe below) and maple syrup. Serves 4-5.


CARMELIZED APPLES INGREDIENTS

2 TBS butter

- 4 spicy-sweet, crisp apples (Jonagold, Crispin, Honeycrisp), peeled and cut into ½-inch cubes
- 3 TBS granulated sugar, divided
- ½ TSP ground cinnamon
- 1/4 TSP lemon zest

Melt butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the apples and sprinkle with 1 TBS sugar and sauté, stirring frequently, for 6-8 minutes, until just starting to turn tender. Sprinkle the apples with the remaining sugar, cinnamon and lemon zest. Toss the mixture gently and cook over medium heat for an additional 2 minutes, until the sugar begins to caramelize and the apples are crisp-tender.

Keep the drinks flowing for the people. Pets should **never consume alcohol**.



New Taylor Ranch Elementary principal has long history with the school

Tara Spielman became the principal at Taylor Ranch Elementary School this summer, but her affiliation with the school began in 2003 when her son entered kindergarten there and her daughter entered first grade.

She began volunteering and "got bit by the bug of education," she recalls. "I felt at home, welcomed and encouraged at Taylor Ranch."

Ms. Spielman went on to earn a bachelor's degree in elementary education from the University of South Florida, a master's degree in curriculum and instruction from Walden University, and a master's degree in educational leadership from American College of Education.

She worked in the Sarasota school system as a teacher, assistant principal, professional development and teacher evaluation specialist, and as a facilitator of adult education before coming full circle back to Taylor Ranch Elementary.

"I have always loved this school tremendously. My whole journey began here. To come back here is an incredible blessing, especially during this time," she says. "The only thing on my mind and heart is to be a support to our children, teachers and families."

Taylor Ranch Elementary has been an A+school since 2001. This school year, it is serving 734 pre-K through 5th grade students, with about 200 remote learners and 534 in person.

"We want families to access education the way they want," Ms. Spielman says, adding she and her team spent the summer preparing not only for the varied ways of teaching but for implementing safety protocols and ensuring socialization activities.

Technology has been a key, with cameras and microphones installed in each classroom over the summer.

Eighty percent of the school's teachers are concurrent teachers, with students in their classroom and some accessing the classroom online. "We had to train for something we hadn't done," the principal explains.

Students wear masks throughout the school day, except when they are eating lunch, where they do not sit next to or across from another student.

"It's not the same as when they had the freedom of communication at lunch," Ms. Spielman says, "but they are still chatting and getting social time in."

Overall, the school year started off extremely well, she adds.

"I was impressed beyond belief at how well the students acclimated. I thought for sure teachers would tell me a student wouldn't keep their mask on. Even our 21 pre-K students wear their little masks. What we thought was going to be a huge issue has been a non-issue."

When she visits classrooms, Ms. Spielman says, "the students are engaged and working. I don't see a difference."

She credits the school's teachers for "doing things they didn't realize they could do" and

for being creative. For example, at recess they give students bubbles, chalk and jump ropes that they can use safely in their own personal space.

Teachers have also implemented programs to help students practice patience and flexibility. One mindfulness exercise involves taking

deep breaths and focusing on what students are grateful for. There are also Sanford Harmony Program group lessons that emphasizes getting to know others and acceptance, as well as the Civility Squad character program that teaches kindness, respect and other traits.

Ms. Spielman makes sure she "over-communicates" with parents as well through automated phone calls, emails and Zoom video messages.

Parents also work together to support the school and each other.

"We loved (retired principal) Dr. (Bill) Bolander, but we were excited to get Principal Spielman," says Lieselot Ober, president of the Taylor Ranch Elementary School Boosters. "It's always good to get a new vibe and new ideas."

Ms. Ober's kindergarten son and third-grade daughter are attending school remotely this year.

Parents, including Ms. Ober, haven't been allowed in the school since March.

She says that is difficult but, as the Boosters president, "my main goal is to keep our families engaged no matter where they are. Every student and every parent is an important part

of our community."

The Boosters are meeting through Zoom and planning online fundraisers and spirit nights at local restaurants.

Ms. Spielman encourages parents and family members to join the Boosters. "So many good things come from that group," she says.

And even though volunteers cannot come on campus, she invites people to use Zoom to read books to children or discuss their jobs as part of the career spotlight offered to older students.

Natalie Barton is another parent who wishes she could be on campus. She sent her first child, kindergartener Paxton, to school this year after debating home schooling right up until school started. She said a phone call from Paxton's teacher, Sarah Hill, made all the difference.

"I can't thank her enough. She put all my worries aside and was so sweet and caring. She went above and beyond to make me feel comfortable."

Still, her child's very first day of school wasn't what she had envisioned all these years.

"It broke my heart that I couldn't walk him into class," Ms. Barton says. "You want to feel like you're a part of this new chapter and milestone with your child."

She appreciates the photos that Ms. Hill texts of Paxton in the classroom and says Ms. Spielman has been "amazing. She is so active. We're very lucky to have at our

New hospital on target for Fall 2021 opening

Wellen Park residents are closer to having a state-of-the-art hospital in their backyard. Sarasota Memorial Hospital-Venice is more than halfway completed. Although the project has faced several setbacks because of COVID-19 and extreme weather conditions, hospital spokesman Kim Savage says construction is currently proceeding "full-steam ahead."

Despite the ongoing pandemic, hospital officials and construction team members



gathered in mid-April for a traditional topping-off ceremony to celebrate reaching the building's highest level 82 feet.

A topping-off ceremony can be traced to the ancient Scandinavian religious rite of placing a tree on top of a new building to

appease the tree-dwelling spirits displaced in its construction. The practice traveled to England and Northern Europe and eventually took hold in the United States. At SMH-Venice, the construction team signed the highest beam and hoisted it to the rooftop along with a tree to symbolize bringing life to the building.

"Topping out is a transformational step in a building's construction, and especially meaningful for the more than 600 workers who have persevered through months of rain, extreme heat and the many challenges and uncertainties of this pandemic,"



says Sharon Roush, SMH-Venice president. "It's also an important milestone for SMH and the residents of south Sarasota County, bringing us ever closer to opening our new facility.

The general contractor is Gilbane Building

Co. The team worked 390 days and 321,500 hours since site preparation began in late February 2019 to bring the 365,000-squarefoot, five-story hospital to the halfway mark. In recent weeks, as work continued, crews have been working on exterior walls and windows, framing interior rooms and spaces and installing electrical, mechanical, medical





gas and plumbing systems, according to Ms. Savage.

Completion of the hurricane-hardened facility is expected in the fall of 2021.

The hospital will have 110 private patient rooms, a 28-room emergency care center and eight surgical suites at opening. The all-private suites include a 10-bed labor and delivery/post-partum unit.

The 65-acre SMH–Venice campus is designed to be flexible, with the capacity to expand to 300 patient rooms, 16 operating rooms and a 50-bed emergency room to accommodate future growth.


SMH expects to open the Venice location with 600-700 staff members, bringing its

physician base farther south, which in turn will help build the medical staff for a future SMH hospital in North Port.

The hospital, at Laurel and Pinebrook roads, just off Interstate-75 in Venice, will plan celebrations for the community once the pandemic subsides. Ongoing updates and a video of the topping-off ceremony are available at smh.com/venicehospitalupdates.

SMH was named among the nation's 100 top hospitals by IBM Watson Health in 2019 and remains the only hospital in Florida to have consistently earned the federal Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services' highest five-star rating since the evaluation system launched in 2016.

For Gene Isbell, the road to IslandWalk was paved with a world of adventure

Lackland Air Force Base, Texas; Clark Air Base, Philippines; Kadena Air Base, Okinawa; MacDill AFB, Florida; Yokota Air Base, Japan; Andrews AFB, Maryland; RAF Chicksands Air Base, United Kingdom; Scott AFB, Illinois all destinations lead to IslandWalk.

For Gene Isbell, the U.S. Air Force provided opportunity to grow, learn and see the world that would not have occurred had he remained in the coal fields of southern West Virginia where he was raised

Isbell, 69, moved from Mascoutah in southwestern Illinois to Islandwalk about a year ago. With his partner of 29 years, Barb, a retired nurse, and goldendoodle Ozzie, the family is enjoying every day on the Sun Coast. They are content with their choice of Islandwalk, a decision made after evaluating numerous communities in the Wellen Park area.

"Everyone is friendly and quick with a greeting or wave as we pass on our daily walks," Mr. Isbell says. "We've met some great people."

Just as the Air Force was a melting pot of cultures and people, he notes the same about IslandWalk. "It's interesting to meet people and discover where they are from and what they did in their lives," he says. "It sparks great conversations about careers, kids and

grandkids, pets, sports teams and places folks have lived

"Those interactions remind me we are more alike than different as people."

Mr. Isbell has a diverse background. His 24-plus years in the Air Force were spent as a police officer, with 14 of those as a K-9 officer.

His responsibilities managing the largest operational Air Force working dog program (24 dog teams) in the U.S. put him up close and personal with presidents and world leaders during an almost eight-year assignment

at Andrews AFB, Maryland, the home of the presidential aircraft, Air Force One.

"We provided bomb dog support and security protection for all movements of the president, vice-president, cabinet officials, heads of state and distinguished visitors to and from our nation's capital," he says. "Anything going on the aircraft transporting the president and others was screened by our explosive detection dog teams."

The job had no margin for error, he adds. "I always told my dog handlers a bad day at the office for them would result in a worldwide headline if anything happened to the president or any of the distinguished visitors we

In addition to protection for Presidents Carter and Reagan, Mr. Isbell oversaw secu-


rity details for the visit of Pope John Paul, the Camp David peace between agreement Egypt and Israel, the return of captured munitions from Grenada, the sad return of 242 Marines killed in the Beirut bombing and the joyous return of the 52 freed American hostages from Iran.

"It was a special assignment. I got to see history unfolding day by day, "he

Alas, all good things end. Mr. Isbell retired from the Air Force as a Senior Master Sergeant (E-8) in 1994 at Scott AFB, Illinois. There, he worked on security manpower and equipment requirements safeguarding Air Force personnel and aircraft deployed during Operation Desert Storm, Operation Restore Hope in Somalia and other military deployments.

"I gave myself time to decide what I wanted to do next," he says as he entered retirement. "I considered civilian policing, but I wasn't ready to strap on a weapon again, so I spent the summer watching the OJ Simpson trial.

"After about six months, Barb suggested it was time to get off the couch. I saw an ad in the weekly newspaper in Mascoutah where

we lived. They were seeking a freelance reporter.

"My first story was about a historic street being refurbished. I covered the ribbon cutting and the speeches by local and state officials. I got paid by the column inch and made \$10.80 for my first article.

"I was on top of the world, ecstatic that someone would pay me to be creative and write for a general audience. I was hooked."

From there, Mr. Isbell rapidly progressed, moving to full-time staff reporter, managing editor, editor, general manager and then to semi-retirement where he wrote a lively opinion column called "Izzy Writes."

"Our group consisted of seven weekly newspapers. We covered local and regional governmental issues, along with school news and sports," he says. "It was highly rewarding and demanding at the same time. The hours were long and the pay was low, but I felt we were providing a vital community service, one that is fading away as more and more small-town newspapers go out of business. I enjoyed our role in upholding the First Amendment and ensuring government

stayed accountable to the people they serve."

The flagship paper in the group, the Mascoutah Herald, has been in publication since 1884, and Mr. Isbell was proud to be part of its leadership team. During his tenure the paper earned more than 70 awards from state and regional press associations for news coverage. "Not bad stuff for a guy with no formal journalism school training," he says.

Mr. Isbell says his approach to journalism approximated his work as a police officer.

"As an officer, you are dispatched to a scene and charged with determining who, what when, where, why and how," he explains. "Then, you typically write a report that is approved by your sergeant.

"Newspaper reporters do a similar thing. They go to a scene, ask questions, make obser-

vations and try to figure out what is occurring and then document it. The story they write must be approved by their editor before it can be published."

All in all, Mr. Isbell says, it's been a good run: 24 years in the Air Force and 24 years in community journalism.


He's an inveterate newspaper reader, digesting two national papers a day, numerous news magazines, the Venice Gondolier and the Wellen Park Journal, plus his hometown newspaper from West Virginia and the Herald from his job in Illinois.


"I love the look of a well-designed paper and the feel of newsprint," he says. "It gets in your system."

He also stays abreast of the ongoing evolution in policing practices. "The profession has changed tremendously since my day," he says. "It was a privilege and honor to wear a badge."

The road to IslandWalk certainly gives Mr. Isbell time to savor his travels and experiences, his love of reading and to enjoy the Sun Coast.

"It's all good," he says. "We couldn't be happier."
